- The Program Committee produced several highly successful and well-attended events, namely: the Annual Meeting, the Spring Dinner and New Members Day. (Thanks to Dale Geslien and her committee for doing a fabulous job.)
- The New Member Day event continues to expand and this year held 19 well-attended activities during the day, and drew 190 to the evening event. (Thanks to Liz Egli and her committee for their successful efforts throughout the year.)
- ◆ The Trails Committee continued to maintain the Connecticut section of the Appalachian Trail in superior condition. All the through-hikers I encountered this year reported that "it was one of the best-maintained sections throughout the entire trail." (Thanks to Ann Sherwood and her committee for the continued excellent job.)
- The Conservation Committee was invigorated, held many events throughout the year, and participated in many advocacy campaigns. (Thanks to Frank Junga and Lisa Spencer for their good efforts here.)

Many other groups contributed much to provide activities and events for chapter members – the East of the River Committee and the Fairfield County Group in particular organized many events. Thanks to all the

many volunteers whose participation kept the AMC the major outdoor activity and advocacy organization in the state.

CONNECTICUT CHAPTER ANNUAL MEETING - 2000

The 80th Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Chapter of the Appalachian Mountain Club was held on November 18, 2000, at the Marriott Hotel in Rocky Hill, Connecticut.

Dale Geslien, Program Committee Chair, introduced Chapter Chair, Eric Stones.

Eric welcomed everyone to the meeting and noted that it was encouraging to see so many members attending.

Eric noted the following highlights from the past year:

"Sue Bartley and Darron Kannenberg started the Young Members Group. Starting with just three members at the beginning of the year, they have grown to several hundred participants, with over 140 on their email list. Much new blood has joined the club and with it they have broadened our scope and membership.

"The Handicapped Trail was completed this year and is a feather in the cap of all that helped Dick Blake complete this 'first' for the AT.

"The web site has continued to improve and is now an excellent source for information. Thanks to Andrea Hebert for her good work on this.

"The Whitewater winter 'rolling' sessions continue to attract more and more participants.

"The Bicycling Group led many more trips this past year and has greatly increased participation.

"Though probably not very noticeable to most members, it's quite a job pulling together all the activities for the Backcountry section of each Outdoors Magazine. Peg Peterson did a superb job over the past year organizing this task.

"Many other groups continued to contribute much to the club. For example, the Trails Committee has a huge job maintaining the AT and all that goes along with it. They work very hard, do a superb job, and receive little credit. Likewise, the other committees are full of dedicated volunteers who keep the Chapter strong, active and providing the outdoor experience to all that wish to participate. It has been a pleasure serving with so many competent and hard working individuals."

Eric went on to point out that, "there is always a need for more of our general members to lead activities and serve on one of the committees. The work is fun and rewarding and not too hard. The pay isn't much, but the rewards are immense in terms of friendships made, self-growth, and providing a general feeling of helping your fellow man. I hope that

anyone here tonight, who does not currently participate in the club, but would like to, will call me so they can get in on the fun."

Eric thanked Dale Geslien and the Program Committee for organizing the Annual Meeting and asked them to stand for a well-deserved round of applause. Eric also thanked those who put on the exceptional programs held during the afternoon.

Dave has been overseeing the Harry Duren Scholarship Fund since its inception six years ago.

Eric then introduced Elaine LaBella who urged everyone to join the Connecticut Forest & Park Association. The CFPA maintains the 700 miles of "blue trails" in Connecticut. The AMC sponsors many hikes and work parties on these trails.

We are continuing to bring guest speakers to our monthly meetings in order to stimulate more interest in the Conservation Committee. We have also instituted weekend hike meetings with guest leaders. These have been warmly received. Specific activities this year were:

- A talk by Robert Thorsen (University of Connecticut Geology Department), Geology of Traprock Ridges,
- A talk by Julie Victoria (Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection - Wildlife), Timber Rattle Snakes in Connecticut,
- A talk by Jim O'Rourke (Connecticut State Representative), Environmental Legislation.
- A hike/talk by Prof. Sherm Clebnic (Eastern Connecticut State University), Effect of Glaciers on Landscape in Connecticut, and
- A hike/talk by Ralph Lewis (Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection), Connecticut Geology.

We are planning a November hike with a member(s) of the state legislature.

Responding to comments that too many hike leaders have little to say about the land on which we hike, we have started a program to provide our hike leaders with some natural history background. Ed Richardson started this experimental program on October 13, 2001 with a tree identification walk. Ralph Lewis has agreed to hold a seminar on Connecticut geology for hike leaders.

Many thanks to Joe Grzybowski, who has volunteered to keep the Committee e-mail list up to date. It's a real help.

The Conservation Committee co-chairs attended a gathering in Litchfield for the Conservation chairs of each AMC chapter. Our ideas to interest new people in the Conservation Committee were well received.

East of the River Committee

This has been another highly successful year for members living and hiking east of the Connecticut River, with 100 scheduled hikes. Tuesday hikes averaged 25 hikers and there were 8-18 hikers on Thursday hikes. This success is largely due to our East of the River Newsletter, published three times in 2001, that gets information out to our membership. Thursday hikes were added to our usual Tuesday hiking schedule. They are usually longer and more strenuous than the Tuesday hikes are. We owe our thanks for these Thursday hikes to John Cunningham, Jack Shea, Ed Richardson, and John Figucia. We've also improved the weekend hiking schedule east of the river thanks to Ed Dresner whose machete has also worked on our behalf to add more trails east of the river.

Betty Robinson, founder and former East of the River chair, has established Friends of Mansfield Hollow State Park, which will support the park as a viable recreational area.

We held two very well attended dinners and slide presentations (about eighty at each presentation), with profits going to the Harry Duren Scholarship Fund.

Beginning on October 23rd, East of the River will offer, in addition to our regular 5 to 8-mile hikes, hikes that are less than 5 miles. These are for hikers who for one reason or another can't manage longer hikes.

On a weekend in October, hike leaders were treated to a tree identification hike. Those hike leaders will pass on to their hikers this informative information.

Excursions Committee

The Excursions Committee coordinates Chapter activities in the areas of day hiking, backpacking, cross-country skiing, and family activities. In addition to the more formal leadership development programs offered by the Education Committee, the Committee continues to encourage and qualify new activity leaders through a co-leader program for new leaders and through rap hikes.

A total of 356 day hikes were offered over the course of the year, with more than 4,000 participants. Currently, there are 140 active leaders in the Chapter, a comparatively small roster given the number of trips led over the year. Thanks to all of the activity leaders who contributed their time and effort, and in particular to the more than twenty leaders who made exceptional contributions by leading five or more trips over the course of the year.

While we have had a gratifying number of new leaders qualifying over the past year, there has also been some attrition as members left the area or retired from active leadership. Therefore, our roster of active leaders has not increased as we would wish. We are keen to increase recruitment of new leaders in order to maintain, or better still, to increase the number and variety of excursions that we can offer. To this end we are always seeking to recruit individuals willing to act as coordinators for family activities, backpacking, weekend activities, and leader recruitment.

For each issue of AMC Outdoors, hikes are coordinated by a different AMC member who solicits hikes by mail, phone or e-mail, and then prepares the listings that ultimately appear in AMC Outdoors. Their efforts help the Committee meet its goal of offering a wide variety of hikes each month to AMC members and guests throughout the state. We would like to thank these individuals for their efforts and contributions.

Mountaineering Committee

We opened the year with a winter attempt on the summit of Mt. Marcy, in the Adirondacks of New York. Eleven intrepid individuals snowshoed or skied to Marcy Dam and set up camp. That night we were treated to 12 inches of new snow. The next day we set out for the summit, tramping a five mile long trail in two feet of snow only to be turned back by the weather a few hundred yards from the summit.

Winter 2000/2001 was a spectacular ice-climbing season; teams were out almost every weekend on trips throughout New York and New England. There were three-day trips to Smuggler's Notch (ice-climbing, skiing, winter hiking) and the White Mountains (ice climbing, winter hiking). In addition to Wednesday gym climbing, members met at Mt. Southington a few times on Thursday nights to practice telemark skiing techniques (an effort we hope to expand during the 2001/2002 season).

As the weather warmed, we exchanged crampons for rock shoes and took to the crags once again. Our season rock-climbing opener saw 20 climbers out -- including a few new faces. In addition to cragging in Connecticut on Wednesday evenings, teams made weekend trips to climb in Massachusetts, New York, New Hampshire, and Maine.

A Summer Solstice traverse of the presidential range in New Hampshire has become something of an annual tradition. This year 4 teams attempted the peak-bagging, 18+ mile, 8000 feet of elevation gain/loss hike that begins in Crawford Notch and ends on Dolly Copp B (or vice yersa).

John Rek logged a record time of 11 hours. Other teams completed the route in times varying from 12 to 14 hours.

As the season progressed, members spread out for objectives further afield. Several teams traveled to the Cascades in Washington State for climbs on Mt. Adams, Mt. Rainier, Forbidden Peak, and Liberty Bell. Two members traveled to Northern Italy for a week of climbing in the Dolomites. In September, members climbed at Cochise Stronghold in Arizona -- our scheduled "major" trip. Two teams climbed "big walls" in Zion and Moab during October, and a group will be climbing in Southern New Mexico over the Thanksgiving holiday.

When not climbing, we were engaged in a number of support activities:

<u>Education</u> - Our annual <u>Introduction to Rock-Climbing</u> class was a sell out with 21 students of varying age in attendance. Two members attended an AMC sponsored Avalanche Awareness program, others took courses in backcountry first aid. Our section taught a workshop

in self-rescue techniques for multi-pitch leaders and "seconds." Former committee chair Paul Maresca provided instruction and coaching in big-wall climbing techniques to several members of the section (the big-wall outing in Zion was a "graduation" outing for one of the students). Informal tutelage from other members of the section greatly assisted in the development of five new leaders on rock and two new leaders on ice.

<u>Trail work \ crag clean-up efforts</u> - Members of the section joined with the Access Fund and the Ragged Mountain Foundation (RMF) to perform trail maintenance and crag clean-up.

 $\underline{Fund\ Raiser}$ - Our section coordinated a screening of the Banff Film Festival, raising \$1,300 for the benefit of RMF.

<u>Access Issues</u> - Many of the best crags in Connecticut remain closed to climbing. AMC regional staff met with our section and members of RMF and the Access Fund to help coordinate an effort to re-open these areas.

<u>Service Work</u> - Several members assisted Everest climber Thom Pollard in sponsoring a day of rock climbing for the American Leadership Forum; participants included State Representative

<u>Connecticut Climbing Guide</u> - Members assisted climbing guide author Dave Fasulo, by traveling to and producing route descriptions for two Connecticut crags; the information will be included in a forthcoming new guidebook to Connecticut climbing.

<u>Gear</u> - We replaced several climbing ropes, adding SAM and air splints to our first aid kits, and acquired a portaledge to support multiday big-wall climbs. Several gear donations were received this year including a pair of avalanche transceivers, and some general mountaineering ice axes.

Clearly these sorts of activities require volunteered time and skill from many people. We would like to thank everyone in the section for their assistance this year, especially the contributions of the Committee.

The Trails Committee had a very productive year that included the following accomplishments:

- All open space mowing projects were completed.
