- The Chapter's web site, <u>www.ct-amc.org</u>, added many new features.

 doing a great job.)
- This year we greatly expanded our flatwater paddling and sea kayaking activities by inviting the Paddlers Network to join the Chapter to form a new Flatwater/Coastal Paddling Committee. Headed by Jean Trapani and Diane Worden, they brought with them many experienced leaders, much wisdom and enthusiasm, and should help the Chapter fulfill the needs of this growing sport. - The Young Members group continued to develop, adding new members, leaders, and activities. And, I'm pleased to see this group participate in many of the Chapter's events. (Thanks to Sue Bartley, Darron Kannenberg, and their committee.)
- The Chapter continued to organize and hold many hikes, bike rides, canoeing, kayaking, skiing and mountain climbing events, and other activities every week of the year. (Thanks to Mark Schappert, Duncan Schweitzer, Jim Linnane, Judy Kunkel, Carol Parker, and their committees.)
- The Program Committee produced several highly successful and well-attended events. Namely: the Annual Meeting, the Spring

- Dinner, and New Member Day. The Annual Dinner has been revived and attendance to it is at an all time high. (Thanks to Maria Athanasiou, Dale Geslien, Fred lannotti, and their committee for doing a fabulous job.)
- The New Member Day event continues to expand and earlier this
 year held twenty well-attended activities during the day, and drew
 125 to the evening event. (Thanks to Liz Egli, Christa Lubatkin and
 their committee for their successful efforts throughout the year.)
- Kristen Grant took over this year as Newsletter Editor and published three excellent newsletters that I believe set the standard for the entire Club.
- The Conservation Committee held many events throughout the year and participated in many advocacy campaigns. (Thanks to Frank Junga and Lisa Spencer for their good efforts here.)

Many other groups contributed much to provide activities and events for Chapter members – East of the River and Fairfield County groups in particular organized many events. Thanks to all the many volunteers whose participation kept the AMC the major outdoor activity and advocacy organization in the state.

This is my final year as Chapter Chair, having served for three years. It has been pleasure to work with so many fine people both from Connecticut and from the Club headquarters in Boston. I thank all that have helped me during the last three years, and I wish Dale Geslien and her 2003 Executive Committee all the best for the next year.

CONNECTICUT CHAPTER ANNUAL MEETING - 2001

The 80th Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Chapter of the Appalachian Mountain Club was held on November 17, 2001, at the Marriott Hotel in Rocky Hill, Connecticut.

Dale Geslien, Program Committee Chair, introduced Chapter Chair, Eric Stones.

Eric thanked Dale, everyone attending, and for everyone's participation in Club events.

Eric explained that the Club is run on three fronts. First, are the members and many volunteers who run all the hikes, bike rides, river trips, climbs, maintain the trails, run the socials and programs, and so on. Second, there's the Chapter Executive Committee, elected at the Annual Meeting each year, which does lots of administration for the Chapter's events. And third, there's the staff and directors most of whom are up in Boston.

Eric then spoke about what has been going on in Boston.

"The story begins some 10-15 years ago. The club had less than 30,000 members and was close to bankruptcy. The trails were in bad shape and the club was run almost exclusively by volunteers who were finding it more and more difficult to devote the time needed to run the club.

"The directors hired a management team and broadened the board to include members with greater expertise in finance, fund raising, recruitment, and so on. Over the next ten years the Club grew in strength, membership and capabilities. It is now very sound financially, has tripled its membership, and has professional staff covering such areas as conservation, facilities, publications, and trails. In the summer there are hundreds of additional temporary employees.

"By 1998 the Club was running well and the directors turned their attention to the future and the importance of the next decade.

"The club decided it needed to address:

- the rapid disappearance of open spaces
- the crowds on the trails with a 7-8% annual growth
- the White Mountain huts usually being filled to capacity
- and, with all this membership, how members' voices could be best heard in Washington and by the various state governments.

"The board decided, along with input from all parts of the organization, to create a plan on which to model the next ten years of Club management. It was called the Vision 2010, which would be funded by the AMC's largest ever fund-raising effort – a multimillion-dollar capital campaign. I'd like to talk about that tonight.

- The theme behind Vision 2010 is protecting and enhancing the outdoor experiences that we value so highly. Protecting the experiences is inseparable from our need to protect the mountains, rivers, and open spaces.
- · Manage 2000 miles of hiking trails, an increase of 600 miles.
- Attract and support twice as many active volunteers to achieve AMC's mission, an increase from approximately 12,000 to 25,000.
- Provide lasting outdoor educational experiences for 50,000 young people a year.
- Provide outdoor safety and recreation information for over 100,000 members and 2 million outdoor users per year.
- Provide high quality overnight outdoor experiences for 150,000 people at AMC outdoor program centers, an increase of 50,000.
- Play a significant role in the protection of an additional two million acres of land.
- 125th Anniversary Capital Campaign a minimum of \$30 million is needed for endowment and construction.
 - Raise \$12 million for Outdoor Program Centers
 - Crawford Notch Outdoor Center
 - Recreation Corridor and New Huts
 - New York Program Hub
 - Cardigan Outdoor Center
 - Mohican Outdoor Center
- Build a model education and outdoor facility at Crawford Notch.
- Add \$18 million to endowment funds for:
 - Trails
 - Huts Endowment
 - Education
 - Conservation Advocacy
 - Research
 - Unrestricted uses

Excursions Committee

The Excursions Committee coordinates Chapter activities in the areas of day hiking, backpacking, cross-country skiing, and family activities. Flatwater/Coastal Paddling Committee

Under Paul Magnuson last year, numerous paddling trips were planned statewide in Connecticut for the spring, summer and fall of 2002. Thirteen events were held and everyone had a good time.

Diane Worden and Jean Trapani, organizers of Paddlers Network, became the Co-Chairs in the spring of 2002 and gave the group a new name, the Flatwater/Coastal Paddling Committee.

An in-water practice session aimed at familiarizing paddlers with procedures for recovery after a capsize and rescue techniques for both canoes and kayaks was held on August 11, 2002, in partnership with the Coast Guard Auxiliary, Flotilla 72, at their facility on Calf Pasture Beach in Norwalk, CT. Perfect weather made the day all the better, as AMC members helped participants from ages 9 to 55 fall out of their boats and get back in.

The Committee held meetings in the spring and summer and discussed a wide range of topics, including establishing qualifications for trip leaders, guidelines for trip participation, and rating trips, especially as applied to sea kayaking situations. Informal paddles were often held before the meetings to expose Committee members to various locations, and provide concrete opportunities to discuss gear, safety equipment, and other trip variables.

Pool sessions are being planned for January through March 2003. These are being modeled after the pool sessions attended and supervised by the Committee Co-Chairs at the Norwalk YMCA from January through March 2002 and which were planned and negotiated by the Whitewater Committee. A general meeting for all AMC members who are interested was scheduled for November 12, 2002 at the Wooden Boat Workshop in Norwalk, with discussion on warm weather paddling vacations for paddlers this winter.

We are seeking additional leaders for trips and welcome inquiries. Both the past leadership and the current chairs wish to express heartfelt thanks to the trip leaders this year for helping us enjoy paddling and good company within the AMC structure.

Mountaineering Committee

We started out this year up in the White Mountains; a group of six stayed in the North Conway area and spent the long weekend ice climbing, skiing, and snowshoeing. After a memorable snowstorm last New Year's Eve on Mount Marcy, however, the Mountaineers took a New Year's off from midnight summits and retired to various indoor activities for the midnight celebration.

Winter 2001/2002 did not bring the multitude of ice to which we were treated the year before - so our winter trips to Smuggler's Notch, the White Mountains, and the High Peaks Region of the Adirondacks saw an increase in alpine hike/climbs and skiing.

Climbing continued throughout the winter at the climbing gym with our weekly Wednesday climbs, and in spring we again resumed biweekly outings on Wednesdays and Saturdays to local crags.

Throughout the spring and summer members of the group took on a multitude of adventures. Our 'annual trip' was to the North Cascades, where a group of six summited Mt. Eldorado, Mt. Shuksan, and Mt. Baker. Another group traveled later to Mt Olympus, and an attempt on Mt. Robson was tried by two of our more experienced mountaineers as part of a team of five. The team kept moving forward despite the loss of a tent, which was blown off the mountain in a storm; they slept in snow caves for the remainder of the trip. A trip to Scotland and England was also made with the intent of climbing a number of seastacks, including the Old Man of Hoy - but the climbers were repeatedly weathered off of their climbs.

This year's climbing season will be topped off by a (hopefully first annual) Beer, Bivy, Bagel and Beginner's Weekend at the Shawangunks in New York. We will be taking our beginners out for their first multipitch climbs. The weekend will entail two full days of climbing (weather permitting), a 'beer and pizza delivered to your bivy site' dinner, and a 'bagel in bivy' breakfast prepared by our leaders.

When not out climbing, we engaged in a number of related activities:

<u>Education</u> - Our annual Introduction to Rock Climbing class was again sold out, with 50% of the class becoming regular members of the group, five "seconding" on a regular basis, and one preparing to take over as Committee Chair for the 2003 calendar year. We also have six members signed up for level I and II Avalanche Courses to increase our winter safety awareness as a group.

Trail work/crag clean up - We again joined with the Ragged Mountain Foundation (RMF) on Trails Day for trail improvements at the Ragged Mountain main cliff. Also, a new initiative was begun for all climbers on our Wednesday night outings to bring a trash bag out to the crags and leave the area cleaner than we found it. We have spent virtually the entire summer cleaning the areas around Connecticut crags.

Access Issues - We have continued to work hand in hand with the Ragged Mountain Foundation on ongoing access issues for crags throughout the state.

<u>Gear</u> - We replaced several climbing ropes, three old club harnesses, locking carabiners and belay devices, and purchased a haul bag.

Earlier in the year, we were saddened by the departure of co-chair Tim Linehan from the Mountaineering Committee. While we have been fortunate enough to have had his company back on a number of outings, we miss his leadership and his presence among us, and wish him the best of luck in new endeavors.

While the loss of Tim was felt throughout the Committee, our functions were able to go on due to the help and guidance of a number of our more experienced leaders, without whom the above mentioned events would never taken place. Special thanks this year for the support of all those who stepped forward and assisted with the chairmanship and trip leading responsibilities, especially Paul Maresca, Ken Klopfer, and Al Carilli - all of whom made chairing the Mountaineering Club not only a "do-able" task, but a fun one.

Thanks also to the many people who kept us going all summer, including those who led weekly outings, taught newcomers throughout the summer, helped on monthly trips, and participated in clean-ups, and are helping with the slide shows and mountaineering table at the Annual Meeting.

Trails Committee

The Trails Committee had a very productive year that included the following accomplishments:

- Completed repairs to Schaghticoke Mountain from last fall's ground fire and reopened the trail in May. We had a great response to this emergency averaging twenty-five people per work date and logging over 700 hours. This project altered our original plans for the first quarter of the season.
- Completed the installation of the vault privy at the Undermountain Trail parking area.
- Held workshops for monitors and maintainers, scheduled the annual Give a Day to Trails event and annual Fall Interchapter Social work weekend, and supported National Trails Day.
- Completed all open space mowing projects.
- The National Park Service sponsored a student conservation association crew for the second year in a row. The crew worked for ten days on the north side of Bear Mountain installing rock steps and scree definition.
- Conducted our first work party to hand pull invasive species on National Park Service land, with technical support from The Nature Conservancy.
- Planted a shrub border and corrected some minor problems at the new parking lot on Bunker Hill Road.
- Moved the privies at Algo, Sages, and Riga camp areas. Moved the chum boxes at Schaghticoke and Belters camp areas.
- Made good progress on the north side of Calebs Peak, installing rock steps, rock cribbing, and rock water bars. Also, rock work was continued on the north side of Bear Mt.
- Repaired the bridge at Stony Brook.
- Nearly finished the new bridge that is part of a relocation being constructed just north of Warren Turnpike.
- Completed a review of eleven vista locations; all were fine or cleared, except for Prospect Mt.
- Worked with private archeologists to inventory cultural resources along the Connecticut Section of the Appalachian Trail (AT).

- Attended the Appalachian Trail Conference (ATC) biennial Club Presidents' Meeting in June 2002.
- Attended the ATC New England Regional Meeting in Fairlee, Vermont in October 2002.
- Revamped and printed the AT map brochure.
